10. What made the slaves of Saint-Domingue revolt?
11. Why were the French unable to crush the slave revolt?
12. What was special about the founding of the state of Haiti?

Level 1: answers to the question can be found in the document; summary, definition, fact

Key words: identify, define, list, describe

what is the definition..., who did..., when did..., what is an example of...

Example: Who assassinated Kennedy?

Level 2: part of the answer is found in the document & the rest is inferred; read between the lines

Key words: compare, contrast, infer, analyze, explain (why)

how did..., why did...occur, what are your own examples of..., what is the main thesis/argument of the author

Example: Why was Kennedy assassinated by Oswald?

Level 3: answers to the questions require you to think; can be moral questions

Key words: evaluate, judge, if/then, predict, imagine, hypothesis, speculate, forecast

is...ethical, what is your opinion on..., what is the best solution...

Example: If Kennedy had survived the assassination, how different do you think history would be?

Should anyone be held accountable for the Kennedy assassination? Why? How?
